

7 Union Street, adjacent to Loyalist House

Untitled, 1985, Artist Unknown

This work was commissioned by Parks Canada in 1985 for the 200th anniversary of the City. The piece evokes the Union Jack flag of the United Kingdom.



Figurehead, 1995, by Carol Taylor

The concept for this piece came from the market itself. The ceiling timbers supporting the market's roof are similar to the hull of bygone wooden vessels. The artist designed a figurehead, such as those placed on these historic ships.

9 Princess Street (between Charlotte **Street and Germain** Street)

Part of 2021's Festival Inspire, this piece was painted as a means to create dialogue of allyship and the shared responsibility to

acknowledge and respect the land on which we live.






place. More than a dozen galleries can be found in Saint John's uptown core, with even more sprinkled throughout our region.
