The Bay of Fundy, home to the world's highest tides, offers excitement and thrills in the heart of the city with the AREA 506 Waterfront Container Village, tidal steps and four-season patios at Ihtolimaqahamok (The Gathering Space), and the Reversing Falls Rapids.

Part of the Stonehammer UNESCO Global Geopark, Saint John - Canada's first incorporated city (1785) - acts as the perfect home-base for daytrips along the Fundy Coast to Fundy-St. Martins and the Fundy Trail Provincial Park.

#### **UPTOWN SAINT JOHN**

The only city on the Bay of Fundy packs so much into our vibrant, walkable, historic uptown core. Choose from over 80 bars and restaurants, discover a beautiful mix of new and historic architecture, explore numerous charming boutiques and galleries, discover a thriving arts scene, and see our streets come to life with art, music, and theatre festivals. Experience the AREA 506 Waterfront Container Village, featuring various retailers, food vendors, public art, pop-up activities and a performance space, all wrapped up in more than 60 shipping containers. Visit Ihtoli-magahamok - The Gathering Space discovering tidal steps at Market Slip leading down to the Bay of Fundy, a 360-degree stage with more public space around it to take in live performances, four-season patios and, in the winter, an outdoor skating surface.



#### HISTORY AND CULTURE

Canada's first incorporated city is bursting with stories to tell. Discover over 100 years of architectural styles on a historic walking tour and visit the Saint John City Market, Canada's oldest continuing farmers market. Learn about the peoples and cultures that shaped us through First Nations Storytellers' guided walks, exploring Place Fort La Tour, and visiting any number of niche museums and national historic sites. Learn about one billion years of geology from Stonehammer UNESCO Global Geopark, the first North American member of the UNESCO Global Geoparks Network, with a variety of sights and experiences throughout the Saint John Region.





#### **OUTDOOR ADVENTURE**

Saint John and the Towns by the Bay are perfectly situated on the Bay of Fundy, surrounded by the Saint John, Kennebecasis and Hammond Rivers. Watch the tides rise by 8.5 metres (28.5 feet) twice daily at the Reversing Falls; hike the coastal trails of the Irving Nature Park; explore the Fundy-St. Martins Sea Caves, or experience 30 km of undeveloped coastline at the Fundy Trail Provincial Park. Enjoy guided experiences with In Step Adventures, exploring the NB Nature Trust; explore Partridge Island with a River Bay Adventures kayaking tour; or hike, paddle and sample the bay with Bay of Fundy Adventures.
